

Linda Vista: A Community of History, Art, & Culture

When you think of the Linda Vista, the arts and San Diego's history might not immediately come to mind, but this neighborhood is rich in both. So, how did Linda Vista come to be? Linda Vista was a product of the "defense boom" that began with the threat of World War II. People began pouring into San Diego from all parts of the country to become workers for Reuben Fleet Consolidated Aircraft. In one year, San Diego's population reached a number which had not been expected until 1960. The federal government went ahead with its plans to build the largest defense housing project in the United States. This project would be known as Linda Vista. Schools, hospitals, parks, stores and services of all kinds were planned to be part of the new community. Linda Vista would be self-sufficient in all aspects.*

In 1943 the Linda Vista Shopping Center was built to serve its new residents and was dedicated by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt herself. This was one of the first shopping centers designed as a unique space, separate

from the streets and the houses, with all the amenities that an American could want, including a movie theater. Similar shopping centers would be developed during World War II for defense housing projects in Los Angeles and Detroit. This shopping center is still in use today, serving the residents of Linda Vista and a commemorative plaque marks this historic site.**

Today, Linda Vista is a community of diverse cultures. In fact, it hosts an annual Multi-Cultural Fair to promote good will amongst all cultures. The event includes a street fair, live entertainment, and a parade down Linda Vista Rd. This year's event will take place on April 24th. Visit the event website for more info: www.lindavistafair.org

Linda Vista is also home to the University of San Diego, which hosts many art events throughout the year. Here's what is currently happening on campus. For theater lovers, *The Country Wife* by William Wycherley, is being performed weekly until March 4th, *The Chekhov/Carver Project*, a staged reading of short stories by Anton Chekhov and Raymond Carver, will be performed on March 30th and 31st, and *The Saints Plays* by Erik Ehn, a collection of plays loosely based on the lives of saints and biblical characters, will have performances in April. All performances will be held at Studio Theatre in Sacred Heart Hall. Are art exhibits your thing? You might like to see a collection of Rubens' works in the currently running show "Prints in the Artists' Studio: Rubens' Print Collection Reconstructed" which will run through May 9th in the Hoen Family Galleries in Founders Hall. You may also want to see what the USD art students are working on by attending the annual "Art Open House" on April 16th at Camino Hall and the "Senior Thesis Exhibitions", running through May, at Sacred Heart Hall. For music lovers there are several upcoming performances including a "Faculty Recital", "USD Symphony Orchestra Golden Anniversary Concert", "Student Performance Recital", and "Electronic Music Concert", to name a few. Mesa College, located off Linda Vista Rd., is currently showing a "Faculty Exhibition 2010" running through March 3rd. An exhibition of student work will begin on May 4th. You can also catch performances of Bertolt Brecht's "The Good Person of Setzuan" at Mesa's Apolliad Theater in March.

CRAFTY How-To:

JEWELRY THAT'S CUTE AS A BUTTON!

Everyone knows times are tough right now so making jewelry out of inexpensive items is more useful than ever! Buttons are a great crafting material and they can be relatively inexpensive. There is also a huge variety of them out there, from Grandma's old button jar to stores selling everything from zebra print buttons to ones with robots on them!



Two quick crafts you can make with buttons are rings and earrings. Rings are the easiest; all you need is a ring blank (sold at any craft store), buttons and glue. What glue you use is actually really important, I use E-6000 because it is a very strong glue but it is also really flexible. Glues like Super Glue or Krazy Glue dry quickly but are very brittle. With something like jewelry, you are going to be wearing it so it will be swinging and moving so you really don't want to use brittle glue because it is likely it could break!



For the rings I like to create a layered look so I will glue a larger button to the ring and then maybe a smaller flashier one on top of that. For the earnings you need only slightly more sup-

plies: ear hooks, pliers, buttons, glue, and something to glue onto the back of he earring. They sell findings that are specifically made for creating earrings, but I find that using a charm, or an old pair of earrings even works just as well and it is cheaper. Basically anything that is relatively flat and has a loop at the top will work. Glue

the charm to the back of the button, wait for it to dry. Then take the pliers open up the loop on the ear hook, slip that through the loop on the charm, close it, and Ta-Da! You have cute new earrings!

the very basic starting techniques, which is great for beginners. You will also find instructions for more complicated projects, so it is useful for a variety of skill levels. There is a "Gallery of Designs" which had literally thousands of user submitted photos. The EncycloBEADia section has lots of just basic useful info. including size charts, a glossary, and more. No matter what your skill level, the resources pages at Fire Mountain Gems are some of the most useful and professional advice that I have found!

IRISH WHISKEY CAKE WITH A KICK!

Caution: This has significant (uncooked!) alcohol content and is not appropriate for non-drinkers. Makes 16 to 20 servings

INGREDIENTS:

For the cake

- 1 18.5-ounce package yellow cake
- 8 ounces vanilla pudding mix
- 1/2 cup whole or low-fat milk
- 1/2 cup corn oil
- 1 cup Irish whiskey
- 4 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 cup (4 1/2 ounces) coarsely chopped black walnuts

For the glaze

- 4 ounces (1 stick) unsalted butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup Irish whiskey
- 1 tablespoon water

DIRECTIONS:

For the cake:

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees. Lightly grease a 10-inch tube pan, preferably nonstick, or bundt pan with nonstick cooking oil spray.

Combine the cake and pudding mixes in a small bowl.

Combine the milk, oil and whiskey in the bowl of a stand mixer or hand-held electric mixer; beat on low speed until mixed well. Add the dry ingredients and beat until smooth, then add the beaten eggs in several additions until well combined. Increase the speed to medium and beat for

2 minutes until slightly thickend. Turn off the motor and add the walnuts, stirring by hand. Pour into the prepared pan and bake for 75 to 90 minutes, being careful not to let it get too brown. Transfer to a wire rack to cool in the pan.

For the glaze:

Melt the butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Add the sugar, whiskey and water, stirring until the sugar has dissolved. Pour one-third of the glaze over the hot cake in the pan. Let cool on the wire rack for 1 hour, then remove from the pan and invert so the cake is upside down on a plate; pour one-third of the glaze over the cooled cake, then cover tightly with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 3 days. The next day, unwrap the cake, invert onto a second plate and pour half of the remaining glaze over the cake; recover tightly with plastic wrap; this process allows the glaze to flavor the cake evenly.
