CM: What advice would you give someone wanting to follow their dreams of crafting, fashioning, styling and creating as a business?

The most important aspect is to have a signature style that defines you and to know what your mission statement is. In order to stand out and be successful, you have to offer something different than what is out there. So take some time to look within yourself and pull out the defining traits of what sets you apart from everyone else and then build your brand around that. Develop a mission statement that is specific to what you are all about. You can then use that statement as you build your brand. You can refer to it when you get confused about something. Once you are confident with your brand and style, then you are ready to conquer the world! Another important aspect is that you cannot go into this business just to make money or seek fame. You have to do it because you love it. Only then will success follow!

CM: As small business owners we at the NPCM are very interested in hearing success stories. Please share some of your memories of making it and some of the highs and lows along the way.

I knew I wanted to live an artful life from the day I was married. My husband is an artist too and we had worked in an office 9-5 before and knew we wanted our lives to be more fulfilling than settling for a career we didn't love. The high point is that we have always been able to make a living from our art, but sometimes that meant making hundreds of pieces for wholesale orders so we could pay our bills. It has always forced us to be innovative and stay ahead. We've been able to travel to teach others to be creative, it has led to book deals and

a national product line. Living as artists has taught us to think frugally and be debt-free. However, there have been dips too. We've had to work long hours to make ends meet. We needed health care for our kids so I did get that 9-5 job for 13 years – but even then I made it a positive.

Kathy Cano-Murillo, aka the Crafty Chica, describes herself like this: "I'm a mommy, wife, artist, author & left-handed middle-child binge crafter Sagittarian. I love chocolate, coffee, and I collect Chihuahua stuff (we have 4 live ones). I have my own product line coming out this summer. I write a weekly nationally syndicated craft column for The Arizona Republic. My 7th craft book comes out next year, as well as my first novel. I make a line of Chicano Pop Art with my hubby and we have sold it all over the country since 1990. Doing my best to live in the moment and savor it all!" wonderful example of what dedication, focus and hard work can do. What would you say is the foundation that kept you dedicated, focused and working?

I can only do that by having a job I love. Life is too short to be negative and grumpy. I look at all of this as a blessing and want to do something good with it, so I try my best to spread positivity. I also try to be honest. Life is not always sparkly, and I share the ups and downs on my blog so readers can see I am just like them. We all are doing the crafty hustle and I learned there are many other people like me!

CM: With Dia de los Muertos approaching how do you recommend that crafting become part of the celebration? Can you recommend a craft project that is both fun and educational for those who want to learn more about the place this day has in Mexican and Mexican-American culture?

Crafts are a huge part of Dia de los Muertos! From the iced sugar skulls and ruffled paper flowers to papel picado banners and papier-mâché skeletons, there is a lot to choose from. I would say the easiest way to participate is to decorate a frame or shadow box for a loved one who passed away. Use small items, colors or phrases they liked. You can also make a collage or write a letter to them. Set it out on Nov. 1, that is the day the spirits return to be with loved ones. It is a nice token to let our dearly departed know they are remembered.

La Catrina Cigar Box Shrine

cigar box, clean
craft knife
decorative scrapbook paper
acrylic paint
loose glitter
thick cardboard
La Catrina image
Sculpey polymer clay (to make skulls)



1 strand of Mardi Gras beads
4 balls or blocks for feet
hot glue (E6000 Industrial Strength Adhesive)
dimensional squeeze paint

1. Use a craft knife to remove the lid from the cigar box and set aside.
2. Cut a piece of scrapbook paper to fit as the background of the box. Use hot glue to attach.
3. Paint the inner borders and quickly sprinkle on the loose glitter over the wet paint.

ASK MA FIOSA

Mamma Fiosa, known more widely as Ma Fiosa, has served as consigliere to the North Park Craft Mafia in all our crafty needs. Lucky for you, now you don't have to be made to get counsel.

4. Apply the La Catrina picture (figure A) to a piece of scrapbook paper to act as a border. Flip it over and glue a piece of thick cardboard to the back so it will give a dimensional look when in the box.
5. Apply hot glue to the back and set the picture in the center of the box.
6. Pinch off four dime-size pieces of clay and shape them into skulls. Bake according to manufacturer directions and then paint on eyes, nose and teeth. Let dry and then glue on in each corner of the box.
7. Use the glue gun to attach the strand of beads around the edge of the box.
8. Glue on a ball or black to each corner of the side of the lid that you had cut off earlier to act as the "feet" to the shrine. Let dry and then set it right-side up. This will be the platform that holds your cigar box shrine.
9. Apply a generous amount of glue to the bottom of the cigar box and set it in the center of the lid.
10. Decorate the outside areas with fancy papers and/or squeeze paint. Let dry.

Tip: Add in personal objects as desired and have fun!

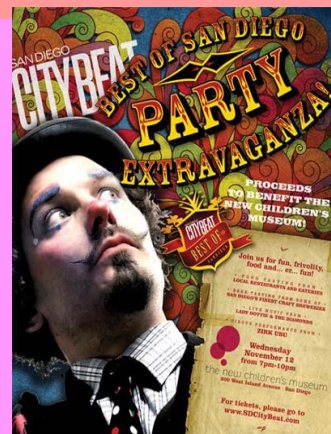
Celebrates Dia de los Muertos

MA MANGIA

THEM BONES: ITALIAN DAY OF THE DEAD COOKIES

There is no doubt that Ma has been influenced by the beauty and soul of Mexican culture. So you can imagine her delight when she discovered an Italian ceremony with similarities to Mexico's Day of the Dead. With origins in pagan days and ceremonies to mark All Saints and All Souls Days, Italians have nurtured traditions around remembering those who have passed on. Celebrated in many but not all parts of Italy, these remembrances and celebrations have always included cookies that looked like the fingers of the dead called *Ossa di Morto* or *Ossi dei Morti*. The following recipes will help you make your own version. *Mangia!*

First Recipe

- 1 2/3 cups (200 g) flour
- 1/2 cup (100 g) sugar
- 1/4 pound (100 g) almonds
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 egg
- Lemon zest, vanilla extract, or orange water

Second Recipe

- 1/2 pound (225 g) almonds
- 1 cup (100 g) flour
- 1/2 cup (100 g) sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 egg
- Lemon zest, vanilla extract, or orange water

Third Recipe

- 1/2 pound (225 g) almonds
- 2 cups (100 g) powdered sugar

Lemon zest, or other flavoring as you prefer

For the first two recipes, peel the almonds and grind them to half the



size of a grain of rice with the sugar. Mix them with the flour and the remaining ingredients, adding enough rosolio (a mild, sweet liqueur) or aquavit to obtain a soft dough. Break the dough up into pieces the size of fava beans; you should obtain between 60 and 70. Put them in a greased and floured copper pan and brush them with egg yolk. Bake them in a 375 F (185 C) oven, keeping in mind that they'll cook rapidly because they're small.
